MESSAGE FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & BOARD PRESIDENT

Welcome to the Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Colchester 2024 annual report. We've highlighted our ongoing work and biggest successes over the past year. We support children across the Colchester and East Hants community in many different ways from traditional community-based Big/Little matches to our site-based in school matches and our peer mentorship program. We have also had the opportunity to expand our impact through our social enterprise, Fundy Scoops. Every year our organization provides service to hundreds of children and youth through our mentoring programs in our communities and in our schools, and provides direct funding support to the families that we work with. Our steps to providing these crucial services include recruiting and screening volunteers, training volunteers to understand developmental relationships, matching volunteers with young people facing adversity, and supporting that match so that our young people realize a positive impact from the mentoring relationship. There is no cost for families to participate in any Big Brothers Big Sisters program, nor is there a cost to volunteer. We believe in providing barrier-free opportunities for children and youth to benefit from mentorship. If you think back to when you were growing up, you can probably think of someone who made a positive difference in your life, inspired you to do something, or make a career choice. When young people have mentors and positive relationships growing up, they have better chances of reaching their full potential. They have more success in school, they develop socially, emotionally, and mentally, they are more likely to continue their education, get good jobs, volunteer in their community, and give back to their local economy. Simply put, the children and youth we serve will live better lives because of your support. Even though our team has supported 136 matches over the past year, at times this year, our wait list has reached 140. That's 140 children and youth in our local communities of Colchester and East Hants waiting for a mentor to make a difference in their lives.

We are always so appreciative of anyone taking the time commitment to volunteer as a big and want to send our thanks to everyone who has contributed to matches that have reduced our waitlist for this year.

But in the background, supporting the new matches and the changes in a young person's life, are a whole range of volunteer and supporter opportunities, from full volunteer board members, to those from the community helping out at events, community businesses sponsoring events and providing volunteers, including RBC, and sharing amazing venues, and we want to hear from anyone who can help us in those ways. Over the last year we, like many other organizations, have been feeling the pressure of the recent economic changes, and a key priority for the year, and going into the future, has been diversifying our fundraising strategy. This year, that has meant, as well as seeing our more established fundraisers Big Bucks and Travelotto, newer events have included lawn bowls, baseball tournaments, dinners at warmth by design, local trivia nights, community focused scavenger hunts, dance evenings, and peeler cards in collaboration with local businesses. Look out next year for even more new events, a corporate sponsorship package, and even bringing back some previous fundraisers! We appreciate each and every donation or contribution that you have made this year, or any treats you've bought at Fundy Scoops, every little bit helps us to continue with our mission and enable positive changes in young people's lives. Thanks for taking the time to read about our adventures in 2024.

ABOUT US

OUR SOLUTION:

Many children and youth in Colchester and East Hants struggle with societal barriers and face adversities in their lives like detrimental living conditions, family violence, risk factors for mental health, school issues and identity challenges. These circumstances have nothing to do with the value of who they are or who they can become, but because of these situations, children and youth risk not having the opportunity to live up to their full potential. Even worse is the possibility of continuing cycles of poverty and crime or developing mental health issues. This comes at a cost to the young person, and to society.

With the guidance and support of a mentor, these risks can be reduced or even avoided, and youth are reminded they can be anything they dream of being. We provide direct service to children by matching volunteers and youth in quality mentoring relationships. Our agency staff members are experts at screening volunteers and matching them with a mentee having similar interests.

PROGRAMS & SERVICES

SCHOOL-BASED PROGRAMS

In-school mentoring – one-on-one matches

- ▶ Mentees and mentors meet weekly at the child's school for the duration of the school year
- ▶ Matches are made based on common interest, location and personality traits
- ▶ Matches meet during the child's class-time and do fun activities together they both enjoy

Peer mentoring – one-on-one matches

- ▶ Designed specifically for high school students
- ▶ Students in grade 11 or 12 (mentors) are matched with students in lower grades (mentees) to provide them with support and encouragement and to have some fun
- ▶ Mentors and mentees are matched one-on-one based on their interests and personalities
- Matches meet every week on school property, usually during lunch break, and spend that time together playing sports, sharing interests or just hanging out and talking
- ▶ The goal is to increase self-esteem and encourage healthy decisionmaking in the students being mentored


- ▶ Opening day was May 17


